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## Logline

When his teenage daughter vanishes on a Crow reservation, FBI agent David Aarons confronts a labyrinth of cartel influence, jurisdictional loopholes, and betrayal — forcing him to fight outside the law to uncover whether she's alive or lost forever.

## Tagline

“On sovereign land, the law has no power — but the cartel does.”

## Series Synopsis

FBI Agent David Aarons thought he understood the system — until his daughter Tyler disappeared. Stranded between federal limitations and tribal sovereignty, David and his estranged Crow wife, Debra Yellowhawk, search for answers in a world where the cartel thrives inside the cracks of the law.

The cartel operates in the shadows of sovereign Native lands in the vast wide-open Montana territory: moving drugs, recruiting girls, and paying off locals who look the other way. Their influence is felt everywhere, though rarely seen head-on — an invisible hand controlling the fate of the valley. Each episode exposes another layer of corruption, complicity, and silence, pulling David deeper into a war that pits his FBI training against his identity as a father.

At its heart, the series asks: how far would you go to find your child in a system designed to make her disappear?

## Legal Boundaries: Native Nations & U.S. Jurisdiction

- Tribal Nations are sovereign entities with their own laws and police forces.
- Jurisdiction becomes fractured when crimes involve non-Natives on Native land: local tribal police may lack authority, while federal and state agencies hesitate or collide over control.
- Cartels exploit this “jurisdictional no man's land” — knowing enforcement is slow, patchy, and easily compromised.

## Missing Persons Context

- Native American women and girls experience some of the highest rates of disappearance and homicide in the U.S.
- Thousands of cases remain unsolved, often due to legal gaps, underfunded tribal police, and lack of federal coordination.
- These disappearances form the haunting backdrop of the series, mirroring Tyler's uncertain fate.

## The Cartel's Presence & Operations

- **Invisibility:** The cartel is rarely seen outright — their power is felt in missing girls, drug overdoses, and corrupt deals in the shadows.
- **Operations:** Recruitment at parties, trafficking across reservations, buying protection from compromised officials, blending into legitimate businesses.
- **Vision:** A hydra-like organization — messy, decentralized, with layers of deniability — making it nearly impossible to take down.
- **Impact:** Their menace lies not in flashy violence but in systemic rot: every silence, every payoff, every missing girl is proof of their reach.

## Series Engine

Each episode blends a **procedural drive** (David and Debra chasing leads, confronting cartel influence, hitting jurisdictional roadblocks) with a **serialized spine** (the search for Tyler). The repeating tension: David uncovers fragments of cartel activity and institutional corruption, but every clue pulls him deeper into a war he can't win within the rules of law.

The season is driven by one question: *Is Tyler alive?*

## Pilot Beat Sheet

- **Inciting Incident:** Tyler sneaks out to a party on the Crow reservation. The next day, two girls are found dead in the Bighorn River — Tyler is missing.
- **Midpoint:** David discovers cartel recruiters were at the party, and tribal police hesitate to pursue leads beyond their jurisdiction. His worst fears crystallize.
- **Point-of-No-Return:** David disobeys FBI orders to stand down, crossing into sovereign territory alone — risking his career, his marriage, and his freedom.
- **Final Image:** David stands at the riverbank at night, staring into the water where the bodies were found, whispering his daughter's name — knowing the cartel watches unseen.

## Season One Overview

- **Objective:** David must find Tyler while navigating fractured jurisdictions and an invisible cartel presence.
- **Decisive Moves:**
  1. Exposing cartel infiltration of tribal politics.
  2. Going rogue after the FBI pulls out.
  3. Facing a choice between saving Tyler or blowing open the entire operation.
- **Season Drive:** The search for Tyler — alive, dead, or lost forever.

## Character Arcs (Want / Need / Change)

- **David Aarons:** *Want:* Rescue his daughter. *Need:* Accept that justice requires breaking rules. *Change:* From law-abiding agent to desperate father going rogue.
- **Debra Yellowhawk:** *Want:* Stability. To protect her community. *Need:* Confront how silence enables the cartel. *Change:* From passive witness to active warrior.
- **Tyler Aarons:** *Want:* Freedom from cartel. *Need:* Realize the cost of reckless independence. *Change:* From naïve teen to survivor (if she lives).

## Comps

- *Wind River* — borrowing the isolated Native setting and jurisdictional friction, subverting by focusing on a father's desperate personal stake.
- *Sicario* — borrowing the invisible menace of the cartel, subverting by rooting the story in sovereign Native land and its unique legal loopholes.
- *True Detective* — borrowing the brooding investigation tone, subverting by pairing federal procedure with familial, cultural conflict.

## Why Now / Market Positioning

- **Target Buyers:** Netflix, FX, Amazon, Apple.
  - **Tone:** Prestige crime thriller; brooding, procedural yet deeply personal.
  - **Budget Lane:** Mid-range (\$4–6M per episode); location-driven, with flashes of brutal action.
  - **Why Now:** Public awareness of the Missing and Murdered Indigenous Women (MMIW) crisis is growing, yet largely underexplored on-screen. This series confronts that reality through a gripping personal story, offering both urgency and authenticity.
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
